# Supporting our community through 2022

### April



The Nest, our fourth child development center located near the USC University Park Campus, officially welcomed its inaugural class of children.

We also welcomed members from the Region IX team of the Administration for Children and Families (ACF), a division of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, and architectural firm Perkins&Will to the center. In March 2019, CHMC was awarded Early Head Start expansion funding from ACF to provide center-based services for 32 toddlers and young children and home-based services for nine pregnant women, infants and toddlers. Perkins&Will designed The Nest probono as a part of its Social Purpose Program.



### **June**

The Champions for Children Luncheon celebrated Hope Street's 30th anniversary and raised a recordbreaking \$460,000. Hope Street alumni who were just accepted into college were featured during the program inspired by Dr. Seuss' "Oh the Places You'll Go!" Honorees included mother-daughter duo the Honorable Donna Garber, former mayor of Beverly Hills, and Emmy Award-winning journalist Linda Ellman; and architectural firm Perkins&Will.



CHMC Family Medicine residents visited children at our Mercy Housing California early childhood center as a part of their training rotations. This rotation serves two purposes: 1) Residents learn how to teach and engage with younger children to better communicate health and wellness topics during their well-child checkups and

2) Children become more comfortable with health care providers during interactive sessions, such as washing their hands.



### **July**

Hope Street's annual Summer of Science program facilitated over 50 activities and field trips, inspiring 126 children to explore STEAM subjects and careers.

#### December

The Hope for the Holidays campaign supported 54 families through Celebrate a Family, a program that matched families with donors, who received individualized wish lists for each family member. Hope for the Holidays also raised more than \$53,000 for the newly established Hope Street Emergency Assistance Fund that provides year-round support for families facing unexpected challenges; and collected and distributed over 2,000 toys to children of all ages.



# **Donor spotlights**

### **Nashuva**

Nashuva (Hebrew for "we will return") is a progressive Jewish spiritual community based in Los Angeles. Founded by Rabbi Naomi Levy in 2004, its mission is: "to serve together, as a community, to bring light to a dark corner of our city." The community holds Shabbat services every Friday and prayer is led by the Nashuva Band, a diverse group of interfaith musicians.



Every November, Nashuva

hosts the Nashuva/Hope Street Thanksgiving Feast and Festival. For the last 18 years, the Thanksgiving luncheon has provided arts and crafts activities, care packages and a feast for 200 Hope Street families.

"The synergy between our two communities was obvious from the start. We feel comfortable together and Nashuva volunteers are so eager and overjoyed to get involved," says Rabbi Levy. "One of our Nashuva young men helped establish the children's library at Hope Street as a part of his Eagle Scout project."

Rabbi Levy also clears up a common misconception: "Some people mistakenly believe that the Hebrew word 'mitzvah' means 'good deed.' But 'mitzvah' means 'obligation,' as Jews we are required and commanded to help those who are in need."



Through its Social Action initiative, Nashuva addresses needs of the elderly, unhoused, under-resourced, people in transition and the environment by partnering with select organizations including CHMC/Hope Street. The intent of the initiative is to serve the city, and create community-building and life-affirming experiences.

"By giving we are always receiving, always learning, forever growing," Rabbi Levy adds.



### Lucky Number 9 Foundation

The Lucky Number 9 Foundation addresses food insecurity, good nutrition and access to education for families and children across the globe. Based in Topanga, California, the foundation's support has funded food baskets and educational programs at Hope Street.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, it became evident that the most basic human needs could be easily disrupted, threatening the livelihoods—and lives—of countless children and families. How can a child focus and learn in school, if they don't have enough to eat? And if education is the cornerstone for a child's future success, protecting that child's ability to learn is paramount. The Lucky Number 9 Foundation's founders have given generously to ensure that Hope Street is able to provide both nutritious meals and educational support so that children can thrive. They feel "it's an honor and a privilege to be in a position to help others. Caring for people is the legacy we want to leave."



# A continuum of whole child and family programs

Hope Street Margolis Family Center extends CHMC's vision of keeping our community happy, healthy and whole. The center offers a continuum of programs that advance health equity across the lifespan. Programs are delivered by a multidisciplinary team of professionals.

**Early Care and Education** offer whole child and whole family care through home and center-based services that support young children's early growth, development and school readiness.

Family Childcare Network provides young children with high-quality early care and education within a home setting. With Hope Street's support, the network has become an incubator for small family-owned businesses.

**Family Literacy** serves parents and children concurrently. While parents attend English as a Second Language and job readiness classes, their young children receive comprehensive early care and education. This dual-generation model enables parents to more successfully pursue their education and career goals.

Child Welfare, Wraparound and Mental Health programs provide therapeutic clinical interventions for children and families impacted by community and family violence and other trauma. Services are provided through clinics, school sites and within the home.

**Strengthening Community** by serving as a resource and partner for grassroots organizations. Hope Street's facility and outdoor recreation areas provide a gathering space for community events and meetings while our staff is available to provide support and guidance.

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
